HELP END THE HEALTHCARE STAFFING CRISIS

A majority of Pennsylvania House of Representatives members have now signed on as co-sponsors of House Bill 106, the Patient Safetv Act. Thank you to Beaver-Lawrence House members Jim Marshall. **Bob Matzie and Chris** Sainato for signing on as co-sponsors. Representatives Aaron Bernstine. Josh Kail and Parke Wentling have not signed on as co-sponsors.

The Patient Safely Act will establish safe staffing stands in every hospital and provide transparency and accountability to patients and their families.

Despite more than 100 House members cosponsoring the bill, it is still sitting in the House Health Committee. It cannot be voted on by the entire House until it is approved by the Committee. Unfortunately, the Committee's chairperson, Rep. in Pennsylvania hospitals. Kathy Rapp, Warren, has not presented the bill to the Committee for a vote.

On February 13. a full-page "Open Letter from Bedside Nurses & Hospital Staff to the People of Pennsylvania" appeared in the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette. The letter is tacks, errors, and deaths sponsored by SEIU the names of hundreds of healthcare providers. It concludes with a request that we, our friends and neighbors call Rep. Rapp to let her committee pass the Patient Safety Act.

The letter reads as follows:

"Dear Friends & Neighbors.

We are the nurses, professionals, technicians, aides, clerks, housekeepers, therapists, dietary, and support staff who take care of you and your loved ones when you walk through the doors of a hospital. We are struggling, and we need your help.

We are facing a catastrophic staffing crisis

Unsafe staffing puts all our lives at risk – patients and staff alike. When hospitals choose to understaff caregivers, patients suffer. Unsafe staffing results in more infections. falls. re-admissions. failures to rescue. heart atin hospitals, as well as Healthcare PA. It includes longer ER wait times, and lengths of stay. All independent researchers and experts have come to the same conclusion: Hospitals must staff more caregivers at the bedside.

> However, because of the unsafe staffing and traumatizing working conditions we're facing, many caregivers are burning out and fleeing the bedside. More than 81,000 Registered Nurses in Pennsylvania are not currently employed in healthcare. Why? The number one reason nurses give: unsafe staffing. To bring caregivers back to the bedside, and to keep us there, we must improve

In a message posted on January 21st on his campaign site, Bernie stated that his highest priority will be to build solidarity within District 10: "The Labor movement is facing some of its

toughest times and we all need to work as one to meet those challenges."

In the spirit of solidarity, Bernie also announced in his post that he would appoint his election opponent, George Piasecki, as the Assistant to the Director of District 10 upon Bernie's assumption of office. George is currently a

USW international staff representative who also serves as District 10 Rapid Response Coordinator.

President's Report

To be clear, this staffing crisis is completely avoidable. We have a solution: **The Patient** Safety Act (House Bill 106 & Senate Bill 240) will establish safe staffing standards in every hospital, and provide transparency and accountability to patients and their families. Not only is it

better for patients, it's better for hospitals too: the cost-savings of patient care standards across the improved care more than cover the costs of hiring additional staff.

> Passing the Patient Safety Act will save lives, improve care, and save hospitals money.

A bi-partisan majority of state representatives agree with us, and have signed on to support this critical law. However,
